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General Guidelines

- Only original work will be considered. Any non-professional conduct, including plagiarism, may result in rejection at any stage of the review process or even subsequently.
- Presentations should prioritize practical classroom experiences and real-world ELT applications where possible.
- All references and resources must be properly cited in the abstract, handouts, and presentations.
- If there are multiple presenters, the primary contact person and co-presenters must be clearly listed on the submission form.
- Carefully review the abstract writing criteria before submission.
- Audio-Visual Equipment: Presentation rooms will be equipped with multimedia projectors. Presenters must bring their own laptops and necessary adapters.

- **Abstract Submission Deadline: 30th August 2025** (No abstracts will be accepted after the deadline.)

Abstract Confirmation Process

Step 1: Submission Acknowledgment

The Conference Professional Council (CPC) will send an acknowledgment email within **seven (07) Working days** of receiving the abstract.

Step 2: Abstract Review & Approval

• Once reviewed, presenters will be notified of acceptance or required revisions within a month of submission.

Step 3: Registration Confirmation

- Presenters must submit the revised abstracts by the deadline notified by the Conference Professional Council (CPC)
- Presenters must pay the conference registration fee: Conference Registration Form Link:

 along with the membership fee (SPELT Membership Link: https://forms.gle/miiSVnRZr]geT3N89 if they are not a member of SPELT) to secure their presenter slot by 30th September 2025.
- Failure to pay by the deadline will result in removal from the conference program, and the abstract will not be published in the Conference Programme Book.

Withdrawal Policy

- The last date to withdraw an abstract is **15th October 2025**.
- Withdrawals after this deadline will result in blacklisting for future SPELT conferences for a minimum of one (1) year and up to four (4) years, depending on the circumstances.

Abstract Writing Criteria & Guidelines (2025 Conference)

General Guidelines

Title Length: Maximum 10 words, concise and relevant.

Presenter Bio: 50-70 words, highlighting professional background, expertise, and relevance to the presentation topic.

Language & Clarity:

- Abstracts must be written in clear, concise English with a focus on readability.
- Avoid jargon and overly technical language; keep the content accessible to a broad audience.

Abstract Writing Criteria by Presentation Type

1. Research Papers (Panel & Poster Presentations)

Required Content:

- Title (Clear, descriptive, max 10 words); Presenter bio (50-70 words)
- Abstract (Research focus, methodology, key findings) (Length: 200 words)
- Relevance to the conference theme

Expectations:

- Research must be well-structured, data-driven, and contribute to ELT knowledge.
- Highlight practical applications for language teaching and learning.
- For Day 1 (Panel Presentations): Fits within a 10-15 min slot, contributing to an interdisciplinary discussion.
- For Day 2 (Poster Competition): The poster should be visually engaging, interactive, and clearly structured. (To be submitted after acceptance)

2. Teaching Tips/Demonstrations (Panel & Poster Presentations)

Required Content:

- Title (Indicates the teaching strategy or technique, max 10 words); Presenter bio (50-70 words)
- Abstract (Overview of the tip, method, or demonstration) (Length: 150-200 words)
- Key Practice Highlights

Expectations:

• Must be practical, classroom-tested, and innovative.



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• For Day 2 (Poster Competition): The Poster should be visually engaging and interactive for attendees. (To be submitted after acceptance)

3. Workshops

Required Content:

- Title (Clear and engaging, max 10 words); Presenter bio (50-70 words)
- Abstract (Session overview, interactive elements) (Length: 150-200 words)
- Session Flow (Outline of activities)
- Expected Outcomes (What participants will gain)

Expectations:

- Must be highly interactive, engaging, and practical.
- Designed to equip attendees with actionable strategies.
- Can be 60 or 90 minutes long, depending on session complexity.

4. Talks (Invited/Proposed)

Required Content:

- Title (Engaging, max 10 words); Presenter bio (50-70 words)
- Abstract (Key insights, main arguments, and significance) (Length: 200-300 words)
- Relevance (Connection to conference themes)

Expectations:

- Must be insightful, thought-provoking, and focused on key ELT issues.
- Should be engaging rather than purely academic, with practical takeaways.
- Time Duration: 60 minutes.
